

On behalf of the Committee and the Production Team, I wish you all a very enjoyable evening's entertainment.







West Side Story

Exploding across the footlights for the first time at the Winter Garden Theatre on 26th September 1957, West Side Story brought the reality of gang violence to Broadway. Based on Shakespeare's Romeo and Juliet, the tragedy of warring aristocratic families, West Side Story depicts the Jets and the Sharks, rival street gangs warring over control of a small stretch of "turf" in a dangerous Manhattan neighbourhood. Shakespeare's star-crossed lovers become Polish-American Tony and Puerto Rican-born Maria, whose romance sets off a deadly confrontation between the two bands of youths.

In addition to telling a riveting story, the show was a watershed in the development of musical theatre. Director-choreographer Jerome Robbins furthered the use of dance as both an expression of character and as a way to tell a story. His dances utilised the main characters, not just the chorus, to physicalise all the relationships among the inarticulate gang members. Unlike the chorus members of previous musicals, all of the West Side youths were individual characters with names and histories. Add to this Robbins's direction of all the book scenes as well as choreographing the show, and the result is that music, dance and story became all of a piece rather than a blending of still-separate elements.

Robbins was also credited with "conceiving" the show. The idea came to him in 1949, when an actor friend asked how Romeo could be played in a relevant way. The choreographer came up with an outline, recasting Shakespeare's tragedy in contemporary terms, with a Lower East Side Jewish girl falling in love with a Catholic-Italian boy. He decided to develop this idea and called it East Side Story. Leonard Bernstein, who had collaborated with Robbins on On the Town, was to write the songs, and Arthur Laurents the book. Scheduling conflicts, including an unproduced musical version of James M. Cain's Serenade - involving all three prevented East Side from reaching fruition, so eventually the project fizzled out.

Then, in 1954, Bernstein met Laurents in Hollywood, where both

were working on films. As the two were reminiscing about East Side Story, the composer glanced at a newspaper headline about recent Hispanic gang warfare in Los Angeles. "Why don't we make it about the Puerto Ricans in New York?" suggested Bernstein. Robbins was contacted, and the project was reborn.

Bernstein was originally to write both music and lyrics. But as the show, now called West Side Story, developed, the amount of music in the score increased and a collaborating lyricist was needed to lighten Bernstein's burden. Betty Comden and Adolph Green were considered, but they were busy in Hollywood. Stephen Sondheim, who had auditioned his songs for the unproduced Serenade, was hired. In the end he was given sole credit for the lyrics. The writing of the show took two years, during which Bernstein took a sixmonth break to complete his score for Candide. Another delay was caused by the number of producers who rejected the project. It was finally optioned by Cheryl Crawford and Roger Stevens. Crawford went so far as to begin production, but withdrew; she was replaced by Harold Prince and Robert Griffith.

Along with every other aspect of the show, the casting took longer than usual: six months. There were no stars, for the cast had to be young enough to be convincing as teenagers. In addition, they all had to sing, dance, and act well. Rehearsals took an unprecedented eight weeks, as the green Broadway youngsters were transformed into believable street gangs.

West Side Story's breakthroughs were acknowledged by the press, but with reservations as to the rawness of the cast. At awards time, its innovations went largely unappreciated. Both the Tony and New York Drama Critics Circle Awards for best musical went to the more conventional hit, The Music Man.

The show ran a respectable 732 performances, had a successful national tour, and then returned to Broadway for another six months.

When United Artists brought the show to the screen, the awards poured in. The film, co-directed by Robbins and Robert Wise, won a record eleven Oscars, including Best Picture.

The musical has been revived at the Music Theatre of Lincoln Centre, in 1968, and on Broadway, in 1980.


